

He recalled his boyhood days in Russia where he was born of Jewish parents December 1, 1874, in the small town of Simbirsk. In this town he received his early education at the Classical Gymnasium, from which he was graduated in 1892 with the degree of B. A. Then he attended the Imperial University of Kazan from which he was graduated in 1896 with a B. S. degree in natural sciences.

As a student he had heard much about the steppes of his native country-Russia. They were the treeless, barren wastes-always windswept. His technical training in the natural sciences brought him into contact with efforts then being made to reforest these wind-swept areas. Assigned to Work in Field Economics

But forestry-truly scientific forestry-was in its infancy in those days. Zon was a student of the natural sciences and as such he had a thirst for knowledge. The year after graduating from the Imperial University saw Zon engaged in post-graduate work at L'University Libre' at Brussels, where he remained until 1898. Still in search for knowledge in his chosen field of work, Zon came to the United States and next went to Cornell University where in 1901 he was awarded the degree of Forest Engineer.

The beginning of his career in professional forestry work came soon after. In July, 1901, Zon was appointed to the Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture as student assistant and was assigned to forest investigations and co-operative timberland examinations in the East. In 1905 he became forest assistant, and for nearly three years was engaged in the same kind of work. In 1907 he was made chief of the Office of "Silvics," which later became the Office of Forest Investigations, and was

drought periods were minimized because the trees held moisture in the soil.

**His Investigations Attract Attention** To prove some of his theories, he established a branch experiment station at Towner, North

Dakota, in the heart of the "great American desert." Here he went to work on technical problems to be faced in planting trees in this treeless area. The first experiments included investigations on the survival and fitness of various tree species for the locality.

Zon studied the similar work that had been started in Russia. He felt he was on the right track, and continued his investigations. These proved definitely that the removal of protective forest and vegetative cover in many sections of the United States had resulted in excessive wind and water erosion.

The results of these investigations soon attracted wide attention. When the present nation-wide drought started last spring, Zon was called to Washington for consultation. Out of this grew the Great Plains shelterbelt idea announced this summer by President Roosevelt. A belt of trees a hundred miles wide and a thousand miles long through the heart of the Great Plains should alleviate the incipient desert conditions common there. Zon's previous investigations pointed in that direction.

When the shelterbelt idea was announced, Zor was named technical director of the project. In this position he is responsible for its successful outcome. He is in charge of development of technical methods to be used in raising the nursery stock and in planting the millions of trees. He will also determine where the various species are to be planted.

Hitherto under the protecting wing of France, she provides additional evidence that she plans to repudiate her association with France. If, as correspondents describe it, Poland's statement to the League came like a bombshell, it is causing havoc and destruction in Jewish ranks. At no time having been credited with fully honoring her pledge to the Jewish minority, Poland's present repudiation of a solemn assurance for the safety of minority groups in her midst comes as a special shock to our people in view of the tragedies being enacted in neighboring Germany. It is just what the Nazis want: the type of comfort to an enemy of Israel which will make it possible completely to repudiate any pledge to Jews who form minority elementswhether it be in Poland or in the Saar Region. The tragedy is marked by an ironic note. It will be recalled that when the Nazi regime first began to oppress Jews, Poland was the first power to protest against perse-- cutions and to demand for just rights for "my Jews" who found themselves under the wing of cruel Hitlerism. > If Hitler has taught us anything, he has proved to us beyond doubt that assimilation can never be the way out for the Jew seeking a world without anti-Semitism.

> Mr. Boyd-and those Jews and Gentiles who speak like him - are evidently the type of eighteenth-century liberal who have Rarned nothing and forgotten nothing since their adolescence.

> He must read the daily papers, yet he doesn't know that the Jews were kicked out of the structure of German civilization the other day because they were the most highly and effectively assimilated Jewish group in history.

When Mr. Boyd writes, "Attachment to his religion is the one thing that sets the Jew apart from his fellow citizens," he shows that his innocence is staggering. Do his Jewish friends sport phylacteries and a kosher kitchen and close their offices on the Sabbath? And does he pretend even to himself that they aren't Jews? I am speaking in words of one syllable, so to speak. I'm afraid nothing else can pierce these childish confusions. "We are and we remain," in the great and final formulation of Theodor Herzl, "whether we will it or not, a historic group of recognizable homogeneity." Wherever we have been invited to assimilate we have made a profoundly sincere effort to do so. From this dilemma arose the philosophy of Zionism, which is fundamentally the negation of the Galuth or dispersion in its present form as a worthy or fruitful way of human life. I commend one final observation to Mr. Boyd and others who talk as he does. There is no virtue in tolerance if as its price you demand of any human being the sacrifice and degra lation of assimilation to yourself. Tolerance means tolerance of difference, respect for other and even alien values. If Mr. Boyd will read the Torah (the Pentateuch) he will observe the constant monitions to love, to protect, to defend the stranger, the sojourner, the ger, who lives in the midst of Israel. Not at the price of his conversion or assimilation to Israel, but in his specific character of a non-Israelite. This truth which we brought with us fullfledged from the Arabian desert nearly 3,000 years ago is still news to liberals like Mr. Boyd. Well, he hears the news at last.
